



Welcome to Fall/Winter!

Thank you to all the Volunteers/Members for your support of the recent events over the last few months. We have had our first very successful rummage sale, worked the entry gates at the Curry County Fair, and executed our 14th Annual Salmon Derby. As fall descends upon us our fish are starting to return to the Rogue estuary and hopefully with some well-timed rain, we will get returning fish to the hatchery as well. This can only mean one thing for the hatchery, the collection and spawning of brood stock is right around the corner. We will keep all informed as to that schedule when we know more.

With the last of the fish recently released out to the Rogue our efforts have turned to working on some maintenance projects around the hatchery. We, with the help of ODFW, have removed the two fiberglass tanks from behind the hatchery building that had been abandoned from fish production. We are currently working on that space to make it more usable for all. We are also refurbishing all the signage around the hatchery. Our resident painter, Bill Budd, is in the process of completing this task. As had been reported, Raceway 2 had a problem retaining fish. With some extensive investigative work by Gary Underhill and his team we were able to find a tear in the pond liner. That has now been repaired and

ODFW has authorized us to use all three raceways for this coming year for rearing of fish. Thank you to Gary and his team for all their hard work!

World Record Rogue Chinook

Have you ever wondered about that giant fish we use every year on our salmon derby poster? Well here is an accounting of a real fish story for you to share with anyone who is curious about that photograph. You can still get a good look at a true specimen, and know how it landed on the wall at the Rogue Outdoor Store.

Here is the true story of an amazing fish as told by Jim Carey, Rogue Outdoor Store.

Mr. Marinsen was fly fishing from the bank, in the clay banks, just inland from the mouth of the Rogue River. He just finished tying up a black and chartreuse mylar wrap pattern fly on a size 8 hook. He cast out and hooked this absolute monster chinook. A boater caught Grant struggling to land the fish and came over to pick him up. The boater assisted in getting the fish in the boat, and several people were witness to the great fight.

Now the rest of the story:

Grant Martinsen's salmon was about to create a big splash in the angling world. The fish was eight and a half pounds heavier than the record for flycasters, set in November of 1987 on the northern Oregon's Trask River. The next step was to get the fish certified by the International Game Fish Association.

"Man, that thing was so impressive," said Jim Carey, proprietor of Gold Beach's Rogue Outdoor Store. The excitement has stretched all the way to Florida, where the International Game Fish Association was fielding inquiries about the possible new record. (For reference, the all-tackle salmon record is a 97 1/4-pound chinook taken in Alaska's Kenai River in May 1985.)

"We had had a lot of big fish that year," Carey said. "After we got that 66-pounder, I guessed out loud that we'd get a 70-pounder, but I didn't actually believe it. I thought it was too late. And I would have never guessed it would come on a fly."

Most of the big salmon have already run up the Rogue for spawning, so most lower Rogue anglers are heading elsewhere or trolling the estuary for smaller coho salmon. Martinsen, a retired biology teacher and football coach, bucked the conventional wisdom. Fishing alone, he launched his one-man pram at a popular lower Rogue hole called the Clay Banks. He tied that black-and-chartreuse fly onto 7½ pound leader, light enough to escape detection in the clearwater conditions.

Martinsen told Carey that, as he waited for his fly to sink after a cast, he felt a bite and a few headshakes before setting the hook. The fish chugged downstream and the fight was on.

Martinsen eventually won a lengthy, but hard fought tug-o-war when another angler in a boat was able to corral the chinook in an oversized net, Carey said.

Martinsen immediately went to shore, plopped the salmon in his pickup and drove to Carey's seaside store four miles away. When Martinsen dropped the tailgate in Carey's parking lot and the salmon's enormous tail flopped out, Carey said, "I snapped 24 pictures before the guy could ask if he could put the fish down." "People who saw it pulled out their camera's and the next thing you know people were filling my parking lot."

The fish, which measured 48 inches long, was weighed at a certified scale at a nearby store and paraded around town before Martinsen handed the fish to Carey, who planned to have it mounted and displayed in his store.

"He was like a big kid, really proud," Carey said of Martinsen. "But I think it was a little overwhelming. We kind of took over telling his story for him."

As for Martinsen's take on his success? Well, he is a bit shy, his son Travis Martinsen said, and he is unavailable for comment. While Martinsen is a no-show, the salmon has garnered celebrity status. The salmon had been whisked away to an undisclosed freezer to separate it from adoring fans.

"Everybody wants to see it and get a picture of it," Carey says. "I'm still fighting the temptation to get my picture taken with it.

And there you have it! What a fantastic catch! Thanks to Jim Carey for sharing his story and for keeping this world record chinook salmon available for all of us to view with awe.

The 1st Place winner was Trish Waters with a 16.1 chinook salmon that was 33.25" 2nd Place went to Deanna Page for her 15.8 lb. chinook salmon with a length of 29.5" 3rd Place was Leonard Krug with a 15.6 lb. 31" long chinook salmon

The Mike Kopec Award went to Kevin Abbott for his 18.6 lb. 32.25" long chinook salmon.


