

President's Corner

As you may or may not have heard, we had a pretty major storm system with heavy rains blow through the state this past January. There were washouts and landslides everywhere you looked, and Indian Creek was no exception. Everyone I talked to has said they had never seen the creek so high. These heavy rains caused two major slides in the creek, one above the dam and one below. The slide above the dam sent dirt and sand down our 12- inch water supply line to the hatchery, which is our primary line to the raceways. That line is also our backup water supply to the incubators, should anything happen to the primary spring water line. We opened a valve just a little on the 12-inch line and ran water through the brooder tank just to keep the line flushed out.

Tom Tostenson got a call from the alarm company late one evening saying that the low water alarm to the incubators had gone off. Tom managed to get the flow back up enough so we could figure out the problem. When Gary Underhill arrived the next morning, he found that the spring water line was down to only two pounds of pressure and that the 12-inch line was about the same and that the backup pump had kicked in. He was astonished to find that dirt and sand had almost filled the brooder tank to a depth of over four feet! Upon further investigation, Gary found that there had been a slide in the small creek that feeds the spring line and that had buried the water intake and also sent sand and dirt down that line. On his way up to the dams, Gary found that the creek had washed out a section of the road just before the bridge that crosses the creek making the trip to the dams

extremely dangerous. Normally, the spring line runs along the ground on the edge of the road, but with the washout, about 45 feet of the line was just hanging out there in midair. A small emergency work party was put together, and under Gary's guidance, the spring line was pulled back to land and tied off. We then dug out the intake on the spring line and began flushing all the lines.





In the meantime, Tom got together with John Weber and got the ball rolling to get an emergency R&E grant to get the road to the dams repaired. The bill to repair the road was just under \$9000.00 with the hatchery putting up \$1000.00 plus some volunteer labor to remove and replace a section of the spring line during the rebuild process. A couple of days later Tom got another call very early in the morning from the alarm company telling him that the low water to the incubators had set off the alarm again. He got things going again as best as he could, but again, the spring water pressure and flow was very low. Another emergency work party was formed and we found that another slide up the creek buried the intake to the spring line again. So once again we dug out the intake and flushed out the line, but nothing we did would raise the flow to the

incubators. We checked and double-checked and flushed and flushed for hours. The water was there but not getting to the incubators. We cycled all the valves in the valve room - opened and closed many times and still nothing. We finally noticed a valve that was half hidden and we cycled it once, twice and it was like a dam broke; we got water! The next couple of days we spent checking and cleaning filters until all the debris in the lines cleared and pressures and flow returned to normal. Unfortunately, during all this low flow we lost approximately half of our fish in the first four trays in stack Number One. This is just a quess, but I would say around 4,000 fish. I feel we were very lucky. As of now, thanks to Tom and others, our grant was approved. The road up by the dam is repaired and the bridge crossing the creek has been put back on its footings. So once again, we have safe access to the dams and water lines. Mother Nature can be very nasty at times!

Notes from Philip Dickson

Please note that Indian Creek Hatchery in Gold Beach, OR (est. 1877) suffered extensive damage due to the floods that hit Curry County recently. At this time estimates are that we may have lost upwards of 4000+ fish eggs in trays. There were major problems with all lines being clogged due to a landslide and wash out. Our alarm system caught the problem and triggered calls to volunteers in the middle of the night. Much hard work by a great group of volunteers (being led by our president and vice president) deep into many nights has allowed us to save over 100,000 fish (King Salmon eggs). Our volunteers are hard workers, but this time we were forced to bring in heavy equipment (real big stuff). There have been at least five pieces of heavy equipment at the hatchery not including all the dump trucks. We have had to dive into our savings to come up with emergency repair money to cover costs to repair dam access road and rebuild water lines. If you are in a position to help with a contribution, please do so. You can mail a check to CAF PO BOX 903 Gold Beach, OR 97444. We have babies in the raceways! We put 27,769 fry into raceway #1 on Feb. 15th. I've started hand feeding them every two hours during the day, getting them started and popping up to the surface to feed. We will start up raceway #2 on the 22nd and raceway #3 the 29th of February. If you're a daily feeder, you'll be taking temps in the incubator room and at the end of raceway #1. Remember to scrub the screens on the raceways. We have new brushes. Also remember to count and remove dead fish in each raceway. Instructions will be on the board for feeding; take your time hand feeding. When you're finished with the daily checks or if you have any questions, call me. Almost forgot, we put the extra five trays of fry into Libby Pond.

Thank you to everyone who voted for Gary and me for volunteers of the year! We won! CAF also took Non-Profit of the Year award. It takes volunteers like you to make that happen. I feel privileged to work with all of you and can't wait for our next BBQ. You know me; I'm always ready for a party, especially if it's potluck! My love of food is showing, in more ways then one. Thank you again for the votes; it means so much more when the community gets to pick the winners. As you've all heard, we lost part of the road heading up to the vault. I've stayed out of that world, but thank you to Tom, David, Gary, Pat, Vern, and Bill B. for all the hard work.


